THE UNVEILING-29 APRIL 1922

The War Memorial at the junction of Congleton Road and John Street was the second memorial dedicated to the fallen of the First World War to be erected in Biddulph. The first was erected in 1921 in St Lawrence's churchyard, with the names of 73 soldiers from Biddulph and the surrounding district.

The proposal for a second memorial met with controversy, as some thought having two memorials unnecessary. Following the donation of land at Albert Square by Biddulph Urban District Council, a War Memorial was unveiled by Corporal J J Gibson on the 29 April1922. Funded through public subscription, a life sized sculpture of a soldier leaning on a reversed rifle, with a jagged piece of rock carved behind, was created in Italian Carrara marble by Jonah Cottrell, who had a monumental mason's yard on Congleton Road. The solider stands on a granite plinth, with the names of the 73 fallen soldiers inscribed in gilt on the four sides.

At about 3.30pm, a procession, which was formed at the Public Hall and headed by the Biddulph Prize Silver Band, marched by way of King Street and John Street to Albert Square. Corporal Gibson of the first Battalion Grenadier Guards, was severely wounded in the Great War and so performed the unveiling from his wheelchair.

During the service the hymns, 'O God Our Help in Ages Past' and 'For all the Saints' were sung and prayers were offered by Mr J Hamlet (Childerplay Mission). A lesson was read by the Rev W A Unsworth (Wesleyan Church).

The Rev J K Cowburn, the Rev F A Ingham and Mr W I Beech addressed the crowd and the Biddulph Prize Silver Band gave a rendering of the Dead March in Saul. The service concluded with the singing of the National Anthem and the sounding of the Last Post. Wreaths were laid and children laid spring flowers, which they had picked, around the base of the monument.



Following World War Two, a granite plaque was placed at the base of the monument to accommodate the names of 39 soldiers who had fallen in that conflict. Around that time the protective railings were installed.

At the end of the millennium a second granite plaque was placed which has the names of 9 soldiers omitted from World War One, 10 soldiers omitted from World War Two and 3 soldiers who fell in other conflicts later in the 20th century.

In later years, the statue has acquired the affectionate name 'Albert'.

Elements of the unveiling service were created 100 years later, remembering the historic event and those who gave their lives so that we may be free.

In war, there are no unwounded soldiers and our thoughts were also with those who returned to our community.

A reflection from the Deputy Mayor of Biddulph, Councillor Jim Garvey: It is my great privilege to speak to you this morning on behalf of the Mayor of Biddulph, Councillor Sylvia Rushton, and my colleagues at Biddulph Town Council. We are delighted that so many of you have come to see the rededication of the cenotaph and to experience a very similar service to the original ceremony 100 years ago.

Those who work to support the community in Biddulph are custodians of important memorials within our time. It is not wealth, social standing or our role within the Town Council that will ensure we are remembered, but our actions. We must ensure that we represent our communities and make decisions that will protect and enhance our town, as Councillors did 100 years ago.

The cenotaph in Biddulph town centre is known and loved by those who live in the town, and those who return to visit. In November each year, there are several hundred people who congregate here to reflect in their own ways on their families and friends who have been affected by war.

100 years ago, the Rev. Ingham addressed the crowd at the unveiling and delivered a dramatic and foreboding message: When the youngest boy grows to be an old man, may this memorial stand where it stands now, and the names engraved thereon be as legible as they were at the unveiling.

He said, this monument has been erected in grateful memory. If ever the community forgot that memory, Rev. Ingham hoped the forces of the air would blast the monument to the ground, and as it lay in a thousand pieces, it would be a reminder to them of their base ingratitude. He concluded that the men who left their homes went out to save our homes, and by the Grace of God and their lives, we had inherited a great future. As a result of what the men had done, that victory had given our lives an enhanced value.

Today, we make the commitment that the memory will not be forgotten. We will ensure that the cenotaph is maintained and that we will provide a place for our community to reflect, grieve and remember loved ones.

We thank those in the Biddulph Urban District Council who strived 100 years ago to fund and install this memorial. We will remember them.

Floral tributes—wreaths of spring flowers were laid by the Town Mayor of Biddulph, Councillor Sylvia Rushton and the Biddulph Branch of the Royal British Legion, represented by its Chairman, Elaine Rice. The Mayor was assisted by Knypersley First School pupils Charlotte Marsh and Sam Chandler. LCpl Louie Marshall of the Mercian Regiment also laid a wreath.
